Caleb Law - inspiring the next generation

Caleb Law attended Kruger State School and was selected for his first Queensland Representative School Sport 10-12 years Track and Field team in 2014. Driven by his Wakka Wakka heritage, sprinter Caleb Law is ready to inspire a new generation of Indigenous athletes, following in the footsteps of Cathy Freeman from Sydney 2000.

At just 20, Caleb has already made history as the first Australian teen to reach a 200m semi-final at the World Athletics Championships and won a global medal at the World U20 Championships. Caleb is focused on paving the way for Indigenous kids. "The Olympics is the goal. I'm proud to represent Australia and my Indigenous side," he says. Growing up in Caboolture, Queensland, Caleb found his passion for athletics at 10 and returned to serious training at 15, whilst attending high school at Redbank Plains and then Morayfield SHS.

As the only known First Nations person on the Australian Athletics Team in Paris, Caleb embraces the opportunity to inspire others. Caleb continues to strive for greatness, aiming to surpass the achievements of Australian sporting icons. "I want to be better than them," he declares, committed to pushing his limits and inspiring future generations.



Taryn Gollsheskey - from Wide Bay to the world stage

As a child, Taryn had the incredible opportunity to participate in representative school sports, which laid the foundation for her athletic career. She represented Wide Bay in Athletics, Volleyball, and Soccer, and had the honour of representing Queensland in Volleyball and Athletics. She completed her schooling at Elliot Heads State School and Kepnock State High School, Bundaberg and continues to officiate for Wide Bay School Sport.

Since then, her journey in athletics has been a whirlwind of achievements and experiences. She has proudly represented Australia at various prestigious events, including the World Youths, World Juniors, two World University Games, three Commonwealth Games, and two World Championships. Currently, Tarryn holds the titles of Australian and Oceania Champion, with a personal best of 61.05m.

Coming full circle, she is now a Wide Bay official, dedicating my time to nurturing the next generation of athletes. For nearly a decade, she has attended the 10-12 years Track and Field State Championships as the Wide Bay Discus Coach. Guiding young athletes and being a role model for children is a role she cherishes.

Walking away from Paris with a PB, Taryn is beyond grateful for every opportunity and enjoyed making her mark at her first Olympic games. She now focuses on returning to school sport in preparation for the School Sport Australia National Championship later this year where she will coach the shot put students.



Tatum Stewart - a journey to Paris 2024

Tatum Stewart was selected to represent Australia at the 2024 Paris Olympics as a member of the Australian Women's Hockey Team. With 30 games and 6 goals for the Hockeyroos, Tatum's performance and dedication have solidified her reputation as a key player for the team.

Growing up in Toowoomba, Tatum's passion for sports was evident early on. She participated in 25 QRSS Championships across five sports from the age of 10, first being selected for a QRSS team in cricket at just twelve years old. Her hockey talent shone through as she represented QRSS five times and was selected for the All-Australian School Girls Hockey Team after

Queensland clinched the gold medal at the Pacific School Games. During a tour in South Africa, she was named MVP, highlighting her exceptional skills.

Tatum played a crucial role in the 2023 Oceania Cup, helping the Hockeyroos secure the series win against New Zealand and qualify for the 2024 Olympic Games. She also competed in the 2023 and 2024 FIH Hockey Pro League and represented the Jillaroos at the 2023 FIH Junior World Cup in Chile, serving as Vice Captain and becoming the highest goal scorer for Australia.

Her involvement in Queensland school sport profoundly impacted her journey, providing a supportive environment that helped her develop crucial skills and a strong work ethic. The opportunities she received through Queensland School Sport were instrumental in her success, showcasing the significant role school sports play in nurturing future champions.

Currently studying Health, Sport, and Physical Education at the University of Queensland, Tatum aspires to become a teacher and give back to school sports. Her passion for sport, particularly hockey, has provided her with cherished experiences, inspiring her to continue her athletic journey and serve as a role model for future generations.



Holly Warn - from school to a Paralympic dream

Holly's swimming journey began with the school sporting pathway, which ignited her passion for the sport and helped shape her dreams. Through this program, she gained invaluable skills in competitive sport that are not readily available for students with disabilities. Holly has always

enjoyed being a member of the QRSS team and relished any opportunity to race, whether it be Athletics, Cross Country, or her chosen sport of Swimming for St Hilda's School, Southport.

In the last couple of years, Holly has focused solely on swimming as she pursued her dream of competing in the Paris Paralympics. Her selection into the Swimming Australia Para Development Squad last year and this year's selection for the team competing in the European Open Para Swimming Championships were significant milestones toward making this dream a reality. Being announced as part of the Paris Paralympic Swimming Team was a dream come true for Holly.

The QRSS pathway continues to inspire and support students with disabilities to be involved in sport and to chase their dreams.



Grace Brimelow - taking on the world at the Paralympics

Every year, from the age of 9, until this, Grace has competed in Swimming, XC, Athletics and Triathlon in the QRSS system. When Grace started, she competed in the mainstream. She was classified in 2018, and has been competing in both mainstream and Multiclass since. Grace competes in mainstream until about Regional level, and then switches to multiclass. In Cross Country and Tri, she could stay in the mainstream at States and be competitive.

Grace started her journey when her PE teacher, Maureen Cummings, recognised her potential and suggested she try Aquathlon. Grace's talent quickly shone through as she made the ablebodied Aquathlon team for the Sunshine Coast Region for two consecutive years. Once she was old enough, she transitioned into triathlons and has since made the Sunny Coast able-bodied Regional Team every year.

Over 2022 and 2023, Grace worked very hard to successfully achieve National Champion status in Triathlon, and Cross Country. Additionally, Grace's 1500m time on the running track at last year's State QRSS School Championships, is one of the best in her class in the world. She ranks above 90% in Baseline calculations. She broke the Australian record for her T38 class last year.

In 2024, she won the State XC for the 4th year in a row.

Grace's dedication and hard work paid off recently when she competed in a World Series race in Spain, achieving a fantastic result that has seen her selected for the Paris Paralympic Games 2024.

The inaugural School Sport Australia (SSA) Games was held on the Gold Coast from July 27 to August 3, 2024. This event featured over 2250 students from across Australia competing in six sports: AFL, basketball, hockey, netball, softball, and swimming.

The Games were designed to provide a multi-sport experience similar to international competitions, aligning with the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games and potentially serving as a precursor to the Brisbane 2032 Olympics. Teams from Fiji and Cook Islands also competed in the event.


