## Sport Competition Guidelines <br> Minimum Venue Standards

The host region venue must comply with audit requirements and:

- complete a procurement process (where required).
- have sufficient and suitable (e.g., cabin/motel style) accommodation within the host town/city to provide places for all visiting parents/supporters competitors/ student officials/team officials
- have access to appropriate transport to/from the host town/city
- have access/proximity to 24 -hour medical services (e.g., hospital, ambulance, dentist, physio)
- The playing venue must be a suitable standard and must comply with the sport specific minimum requirements. Consideration must also be given to factors such as:
- sufficient number of suitably sized change rooms present
- spectators must be adequately catered for with suitable viewing, toilet facilities, canteen etc.
- Competition Area - Field of Play/number of courts or fields required
- Suitable shade \& shelter for hot \& wet weather if necessary
- Access to water
- Officials' Room with secure area for official's bags
- Championship working group control room
- Access to internet
- Laptop and printer
- Photocopier
- Paper
- General stationery


## First Aid

A minimum of two First Aid Officers/Sports Trainers must be provided each day of competition.
Any child treated must be accompanied by a Team Official or parent.

## Spectator's facilities

Ensure there is sufficient shade, seating, toilets facilities, food and drinks vendors.

## Officials

It is preferable that all key officials have a minimum Level accreditation and first aid/CPR. The key officials are (but not limited to):

- Tournament Director
- Technical Convenor
- Chief Referee (Umpire Assessor)

Additional officials required (list individually)
Student Officials - insert QRSS 'categories'

## Equipment

- The Host Region must supply all equipment for the safe conduct of the Championships.
- All equipment must comply with sport specific requirements
- Other necessary equipment is:
- Competition Software (if applicable)
- Access Passes (if applicable)

Competition areas must be checked each day for potential hazards and steps must be taken to rectify or make safe these potential hazards.

## Queensland Representative School Sport

## Duration and Draws

Duration of championships are to be scheduled to use no more than two school days for competition. Where this cannot occur, the Host Region will communicate with the QRSS - RC and QRSS for approval and endorsement.

Such issues may include:

- availability of venues,
- number of games played per day etc.

At each State Championship for team sports, the draw must ensure that all teams play on each day of the event.

At each State Championship a Queensland team may be selected and named (as a travelling or merit team). No other teams are to be named.

The sport specific competition procedures outline the draws and round robin matches to be played for various formats.

| State <br> Championship <br> Team Officials | - Team Officials at each of the state championships will include 2 officials consisting of a coach and manager per team. <br> - Coaches and managers of the playing teams will be restricted to occupying the Coach's box during the playing time. <br> - Should the development of future officials be supported by regions, these officials will be allowed in the team dugout or coaches box. <br> - Managers will be allowed on the field of play to attend injuries when called upon by the umpire. <br> - All officials entering the field of play must be in the program and be a registered teacher, or authorised personnel. |

| Umpires/Referees | - Student Officials will be appointed to the 10-12yrs, 13-15yrs and 16-19yrs Championships. <br> - Student Officials will go through an application process and will be recommended by a selection panel from their listed level of skill and experience. <br> - Student Officials may be required for both umpiring and tech bench duties. <br> - Encouragement of officials should occur for students wishing to develop as Technical Officials as a distinct pathway. |
| Appointment of Queensland Team Officials | - Appointment will be in line with the QRSS Leadership Handbook process. <br> - QRSS will advertise for Queensland Team Officials annually. This will be advertised on the QRSS website, QRSS Facebook page and distributed by email to all Committees, RSSO's, District Secretaries, current Officials and schools. <br> - Applicants wishing to apply for a Queensland Team Official position will be asked to provide the following: <br> - Two (2) page sport specific resume including contact details for 2 referees. <br> - Maximum one (1) page written response addressing 4 key capabilities listed below. <br> - It is preferred that applicants for Queensland Teams positions must have attended a minimum of two state championships as a regional official, championship convenor or member of the committee executive. This allows for quality assurance of officiating skills. |
| Appointment of Selectors | - A panel of selectors will be appointed to ensure a transparent, fair and equitable selection process has occurred at the trial/event. <br> - The selection panel will consist of no less than 3 selected officials, one of whom will be the Queensland coach. <br> - Independent selectors may be appointed by the QRSS-SE when playing a round robin draw or when circumstances arise requiring additional key personnel, and communicated to the Host Region to ensure they are included in the budget. <br> - Panelists are to ensure they use the criteria provided (where required) and send a PDF copy of the feedback to QRSS for storing. <br> - At least one member of the selector panel must be present at each game. |
| Announcement of the state team | - The state team must be named at the State Championship by the state coach or manager. <br> - The selection of the state team/s or merit team should take place in accordance with the QRSS-SE selection policy as adopted and approved by the QRSS-B. <br> - The names of reserve/shadow team members may be announced at the closing ceremony. <br> - A meeting of selected state team players, their parent or carer (if available) and officials will occur at the end of the closing ceremony. <br> - It is preferred that Team members should be provided with the appropriate permission forms, proposed itinerary, levy costs and independent travel expectations on the day of selection. Should this not be possible, this communication should occur within one week of the conclusion of the state championships. |
| Minimum Venue Standard | - All games are to be played on a field in line with International Hockey Federation rules. |

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|  | - 10-12yrs require a minimum of 4 fields, two turf and 2 grass fields. <br> - 13-15yrs require a minimum of 2 turf fields. <br> - 16-19yrs require a minimum of 2 turf fields. <br> - Venue facilities are to have dug outs, tech benches, suitably sized dressing rooms and spectator seating around turf fields. Tech benches are required with appropriate dug outs using shade tents and player only zones arranged for grass fields. <br> - Spectators to be adequately catered for with suitable viewing, toilet facilities, canteens etc. |

| Eligibility | - Participants must be turning 10, 11 or 12 in the year of competition to be eligible for the 10-12yrs state and national events. <br> - Participants must be turning 13,14 or 15 in the year of competition to be eligible for the 13-15yrs state and national events. <br> - Participants must be turning 16, 17, 18 or 19 in the year of competition to be eligible for the 16-19yrs state event and merit team. |
| Participation Expectations Hockey | It is recommended that: <br> - Captains give traditional three cheers for the opposing team and umpires while teams members are to shake hands at the conclusion of each game. <br> - Players should be appropriately dressed at all times throughout the state or national championships. <br> - Students are to follow QRSS codes of behaviour at all times. <br> - Any student heard back chatting umpires or displaying any other behaviour that is considered unacceptable should be addressed by team officials. This may involve removal from the field of play in order to cool down and reflection before returning to the game. <br> - A judiciary of three officials should be utilised to address ongoing unacceptable behaviour throughout the championships. |
| Playing uniform | Regional Team <br> - Compulsory Playing uniforms for boys may include: playing top with number, playing shorts, hockey socks, water bottle and hat. <br> - Compulsory Playing uniforms for girls may include: playing top with number, playing skirt, bike pants, hockey socks, water bottle and hat. <br> - Goalkeeper smocks are to be a different colour from both his/her team's and the opposition teams colours. Playing bottoms are the individual choice of the goalkeeper. They should choose either bike pants, shorts, or a skirt option that provides appropriate safety for their playing position. <br> - Captains must wear a distinctive band or similar distinguishing article. <br> State Team - Compulsory Competition Uniform <br> - Boys: Playing top with number, playing shorts with number, 2 x hockey socks in a light and a dark colour. <br> - Girls: Playing top with number, playing skirt with number, bike pants, 2 x hockey socks in a light and a dark colour. <br> - Goalkeepers: Goalie Smocks are to be different from both the team's colour and the opposition teams colours, playing top, playing bottoms (pants/bike pants); 2 x hockey socks in a light colour and a dark colour. <br> - Captains must wear a distinctive band or similar distinguishing article. |
| Match equipment | - Kookaburra Dimple Elite MK2 Hockey Balls x 2 dozen per event. <br> - The 10-12yrs working group may choose appropriate balls for grass fields. |
| Team Size | Where possible align to the SSA rules of competition. <br> - 10-12yrs: up to 14 players - 13 field players with one goal keeper. |

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|  | - 13-15yrs: up to 16 players - 14 field players and 2 goal keepers. <br> - 16-19yrs: up to 16 players -14 field players and 2 goal keepers. |

| First Aid | - Team Managers are required to store student medical needs appropriately. The procedures for administrating medicines need to be followed for each student, based on their medical details/history or current health plan. <br> - Blood rule: Any player with blood will be removed and substituted from the field of play. Local hockey centres will have blood rules for their turf which will be followed. Clean up will occur before time is called back on. <br> - Concussion: All officials will have completed the Sport Australia online training modules, as part of their induction process. Any student suspected of a head knock will be treated by the Sport Medicine official in attendance at the championship. A student who has received a direct impact to the head or body that has caused the head to move rapidly will be removed from play for a minimum of 48 hrs and should seek medical advice. Officials must follow the medical advice provided by the student's doctor. Medical clearance is required for the student to return to full play. <br> - Emergency procedures: The appointed sports medicine (first aid officer) is the designated case manager for all injuries and subsequent treatment. The appointed sports medicine officer approves the player re-entering the field after the initial treatment. The Regional Manager is the designated liaison with the appointed sports medicine officer. <br> - Treatment: The umpire will stop play and call the team manager onto the field. A replacement player is able to take the field straight away. Any player with an open cut or abrasion, concussion or blood on any part of his/her body or uniform, is to be removed from the field of play for treatment or cleaning. |
| Spectator's facilities | - The Ground Manager and Convenor are responsible for ensuring the safety of players and officials. <br> - Parents are not permitted to enter the field of play. <br> - Grandstand seating or covered seating is preferred for suitable viewing. <br> - A canteen is to be available, supplying a variety of snacks and lunch time options. <br> - Toilet facilities cleaned regularly throughout the day. <br> - Coffee Van or station will be appreciated. <br> - Have sufficient and suitable accommodation within the host town/city to provide places for all visiting parents/supporters, student officials, and team officials. |
| Trophies and presentations | - Medallions will be awarded to the top three regional teams at the conclusion of the championships. <br> - Perpetual trophies will be awarded to the winning championship team (highest ranked team after the final game on the last day). <br> - Umpires of the 10-12yrs Championship will be selected and announced to attend the 10-12yrs SSA National event. <br> - Umpires of the 13-15yrs Championship will be selected and announced to attend the $13-15 y$ y SSA National event. <br> - Umpires of the $16-19 y r s$ will be selected and named with the merit team. <br> 10-12yrs Girls \& Boys <br> - Girls Perpetual Trophy: Jodie Kenny Perpetual Hockey Stick Trophy <br> - Boys Perpetual Trophy: Mark Knowles Perpetual Hockey Stick Trophy <br> - MVP - Player of the Championships <br> - Minor Placing "Plate Winner" |

| Selection of referee/umpires to attend National Championships | - A minimum of one student official will be selected to attend the SSA Championship for their respective age division based on their performance at the 10-12, 13-15 girls and boys state championships. <br> - If Queensland is host to any SSA events, then up to 4 student officials will be selected. |
| School Based Competitions | - Currently two Schools Competitions exists, one in Toowoomba and the other in the South East consisting of private schools. A few clusters of schools through out the state provide a school-based opportunity for hockey development. |

## Championship Rules and Guidelines

## Complaints Management

A disputes committee will be established at the pre-carnival meeting. This committee will include the QRSS Hockey Executive Chair/Member delegate, Host Region RSSO/delegate and Carnival Convenor. If one of these members is not in attendance, the Host Region will determine the final member at the pre-carnival meeting. In the event of an issue developing which cannot be resolved at all levels of the pathway, the responsible officer at the event will work with the Host Region RSSO, QRSSR Hockey Executive, QRSSR C and where necessary the Regional Director.

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## Game time

All games shall be played in 15 minute quarters with 2 minute interval and 5 minute half time, unless otherwise stated in the published competition draw. If a stroke or penalty corner is in progress when the siren is blown, the stroke or penalty corner will be completed before the umpires blow time. Equitable game time must occur for all students within the QRSS program. Equitable field time procedure aligns with the QRSS program's values of fairness, diversity and inclusivity. Coaches and convenors should actively promote these values among participants, fostering a positive and respectful sports environment. Unexpected situations, such as injuries may require adjustments to the allocation of playing time.

## Injury time

Injury time is allowed for the final series matches only. In the interest of fair play, where a serious injury occurs in a pool match, time out will be called at the discretion of the umpire's convenor/SOM in consultation with the Hockey Executive and sport medicine personnel. A game will be abandoned for safety reasons if less than 30 mins has been played, and will be considered a draw. If more than 30 mins has played then the current result will stand.

## Stoppages and Interruptions to Play

Where the championship is affected by weather or other events, including and not restrictive to rain, hail, storms, lightning, floods, field conditions etc. stoppages or cancellations of a game, games or the final series, will be at the discretion of the convenor/tournament director. They will take advice from the umpires, technical manager, ground staff and local officials with knowledge of weather patterns, drying out times etc. The convenor/tournament director will primarily exercise a duty of care to all players, umpires and officials and will also give due consideration to care and preservation of playing fields.

## Championship Points

Points will be awarded as follows:

- Win 3 points
- Draw 1 point
- Loss 0 points
- Forfeit 0 points

After the matches are played between teams within each 'pool', rank order will be named on the following basis:

- Points gained from the 'Pool' matches
- Goal Differences
- Greatest number of goals for
- Least number of goals against
- Then consider the result of the game between the two teams.

Minor Placing: A round robin will be played for the minor placing $\left(7^{\text {th }}, 8^{\text {th }}, 9^{\text {th }}\right.$ and $10^{\text {th) }}$. The point system for the round robin will be the same as the pool games above. If after the matches in the round robin, teams have equal points, the final placing will be decided on the following basis:

- Goal Differences
- Greatest number of goals for
- Least number of goals against
- Then consider the result of the game between the two teams
- Equal place - a coin toss will decide placement for the following year.


## Playing Surface

Working Committees endeavour to conduct championships on an artificial surface. Equity in terms of surfaces use is always considered.

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## 10-12 Years Boys \& Girls

## Alternate Game Time

A round robin format is the preferred option at the State Championships. The working party voted to trial a Pool System in 2024 and will decide the best way forward from 2024. SSA rules and procedures play a round robin format therefore aligning with the National pathway.

- Games will be played in two 25 -minute halves with a five-minute interval.
- Rolling substitutions are permitted from the centre line at any time during the game, except on a penalty corner.
- Games will start on the central siren, with a starting whistle from the umpire. A warning signal will be given one minute prior to the commencement of each passage of player. Teams must be in position and ready to play.


## Championship Points

Points will be awarded as follows:

- Win 3 points
- Draw 2 point
- Loss 1 points
- Forfeit 1 points
- There are no finals.
- The team with the greatest number of points at the conclusion of the championship will be declared the winner. In the event of teams having the same number of points, a joint position will be declared.


## Carded Players

- Any student heard back chatting umpires or displaying any other behaviour that is considered unacceptable should be addressed by team officials. This may involve removal from the field of play in order for a cool down and reflection before returning to the game.
- A judiciary of three officials should be utilised to address ongoing unacceptable behaviour throughout the tournament.


## 13-15 \& 16-19 years Boys

Suspensions/ Carded Players

- A judiciary of three officials will have authority to suspend players for one or more matches of the competition.
- Where a player is awarded a red card, an automatic one-match suspension will apply.
- Where a player receives a yellow or red card, it will be the responsibility of the team manager to submit the student's name to the judiciary and Umpire's Convenor for review.
- The penalty points will be accumulative during the Pool games and all Finals. These points will apply to player's behaviour before, during and after a match of the championship. They will also apply to players and officials on the bench.
- Where a second red card is issued, the player will be automatically suspended from the remainder of the championship. Team managers will notify the player's school and the relevant regional school sports officer of the incident.


## 13-15 \& 16-19 years Girls

## Suspensions/ Carded Players

- A judiciary of three officials will have authority to suspend players for one or more matches of the competition.
- Where a player is awarded a red card, an automatic one-match suspension will apply.
- Where a player receives a yellow or red card, it will be the responsibility of the team manager to submit the student's name to the judiciary and Umpire's Convenor for review.
- The penalty points will be accumulative during the Pool games and all Finals. These points will apply to player's behaviour before, during and after a match of the championship. They will also apply to players and officials on the bench.


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- Where a second red card is issued, the player will be automatically suspended form the remainder of the championship. Team managers will notify the player's school and the relevant regional school sports officer of the incident.


## Extra Information

## Regional Delegates Role

The regional delegate plays a role in connecting the work of their Hockey Executive with their region.
QRSSR Hockey Executive:

- Are to identify the regional delegates in their action plans.
- This is to be communicated with QRSS-C and regions.
- Meeting will be scheduled once a semester, or where required.
- Liaise with regional delegates to ensure communication is streamlined and only information distributed is endorsed and approved by QRSS Hockey Executive.

The regional delegate role is to:

- Communicate with the Hockey Executive regularly
- Establish strong working relationship with the regions
- Delegates may be invited to form QRSS Hockey Executive sub-Committees for any working groups
- Attend meeting as outlined by the QRSS Hockey Executive, with minutes recorded by a Hockey Executive member.


## Team Managers

Team managers will submit the team list summary form prior to the state championships to the appropriate personnel by the due date e.g., RSSO. Dates of birth will be required to differentiate any possible selection process.

## Hockey Executive Committee Report

The Hockey Executive are required to submit an annual report. This report is to be submitted to QRSSMC and QRSS-R. The reports are documents that provide detailed information and updates about the activities, decisions and progress of Committees within QRSS. These reports are essential for transparency and communication within the program. Annual Reports are due by the end of the school year.

- The cost of this person is included into the budget and will be included in the team levy.


## Process

## Prior to the Championship

1. Queensland Representative School Sport advertises for Team Official positions
2. Successful applicants must complete the mandatory training prior to the State Championship
3. QRSS will communicate the Chair of Selectors to each region
4. Region will send the final team lists to the Chair of Selectors
5. As part of bulletin 2, Regions will request nominations for the panel of selectors
6. Chair of selectors will complete the selectors booklet for distribution at the Pre-Championship meeting

## At the Championship

1. Chair of selectors establishes a roster for each game
2. At least one member of the selection panel must be present for each game
3. Each panel member must attempt to see part of each of the games (draw permitting)
4. Regional team officials must be consulted daily regarding selection
5. Notes must be kept for each athlete wishing to be selected
